## Genesis 25:19-34

<sup>19</sup> These are the generations of Isaac, Abraham's son. Abraham was the father of Isaac. <sup>20</sup> Isaac was forty years old when he took Rebekah as his wife, the daughter of Bethuel the Syrian of Paddan Aram, the sister to Laban the Syrian. <sup>21</sup> Now Isaac pleaded with Adonai for his wife, because she was barren; and Adonai his plea, and Rebekah his wife conceived. <sup>22</sup> But the children struggled together within her, and she said, "If all is well, why am I like this?" So she went to inquire of Adonai. <sup>23</sup> Then God said to her, "Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples will be separated from your body; one people will be stronger than the other, and the older will serve the younger."<sup>24</sup> Now when the time of her delivery came, there were twins in her womb. <sup>25</sup> The first came out red all over, like a hairy garment, and they called his name Esau. <sup>26</sup> After that, his brother came out, and his hand took hold of Esau's heel, so he was named Jacob. Isaac was sixty years old when she bore them. <sup>27</sup> So the boys grew. Esau was a cunning hunter, a man of the field, while Jacob was a calm man, living in tents. <sup>28</sup> Isaac loved Esau, because he ate of his game, but Rebekah loved Jacob. <sup>29</sup> Now Jacob cooked a stew; and Esau came in from the field and he was famished. <sup>30</sup> So Esau said to Jacob, "Please feed me some of that red stew, for I am famished." Therefore his name was called Edom. <sup>31</sup> Then Jacob said, "First sell me your birthright." <sup>32</sup> Esau said, "Look, I am about to die; of what use is the birthright to me?" <sup>33</sup> Then Jacob said, "Swear to me this day." So he swore to him, and he sold his birthright to Jacob. <sup>34</sup> Then Jacob gave Esau bread and lentil stew. Then he ate and drank, arose, and went his way. Thus Esau despised his birthright.

## Malachai 1:1-3

<sup>1</sup> The word of Adonai came to Israel through Malachi: <sup>2</sup> "I have shown love to you," says Adonai but you say, "How have you shown love to us?" "Esau was Jacob's brother," Adonai explains, "yet I chose Jacob <sup>3</sup>and rejected Esau. I turned Esau's mountains into a deserted wasteland and gave his territory to the wild jackals."
