Genesis 23:1-13

¹ Sarah lived 127 years. ² Then she died in Kiri'ath Arba (that is, Hebron) in the land of Canaan. Abraham went to mourn for Sarah and to weep for her. ³ Then Abraham got up from mourning his dead wife and said to the sons of Heth, 4 "I am a foreign resident, a temporary settler, among you. Grant me ownership of a burial site among you so that I may bury my dead." 5 The sons of Heth answered Abraham, 6 "Listen, sir, you are a mighty prince among us! You may bury your dead in the choicest of our tombs. None of us will refuse you his tomb to prevent you from burying your dead." 7 Abraham got up and bowed down to the local people, the sons of Heth. ⁸ Then he said to them, "If you agree that I may bury my dead, then hear me out. Ask Ephron the son of Zohar 9 if he will sell me the cave of Machpelah that belongs to him; it is at the end of his field. Let him sell it to me publicly for the full price, so that I may own it as a burial site." 10 (Now Ephron was sitting among the sons of Heth.) Ephron the Hittite replied to Abraham in the hearing of the sons of Heth—before all who entered the gate of his city—11 "No, my lord! Hear me out. I sell you both the field and the cave that is in it. In the presence of my people I sell it to you. Bury your dead." ¹² Abraham bowed before the local people ¹³ and said to Ephron in their hearing, "Hear me, if you will. I pay to you the price of the field. Take it from me so that I may bury my dead there."

1 Kings 1:5-9

⁵ Adonijah was the son of King David and Haggith, and he was very proud. "I will be the king," he said. So he got chariots and horses for himself and fifty men for his personal bodyguard. ⁶ Now David had never interfered with Adonijah by questioning what he did. Born next after Absalom, Adonijah was a very handsome man. ⁷ Adonijah spoke with Joab, son of Zeruiah, and Abiathar the priest, and they agreed to help him. ⁸ But Zadok, the priest, Benaiah son of Jehoyada, Nathan the prophet, Shimei, Rei, and King David's special guard did not join Adonijah.

Welcome to Congregation Schaarai Zedek's Saturday morning Shabbat service.
