## Leviticus 13:47-56

<sup>47</sup> As for any fabric that is spoiled with a defiling mold—any woolen or linen clothing, <sup>48</sup> any woven or knitted material of linen or wool, any leather or anything made of leather—<sup>49</sup> if the affected area in the fabric, the leather, the woven or knitted material, or any leather article, is greenish or reddish, it is a defiling mold and must be shown to the priest. <sup>50</sup> The priest is to examine the affected area and isolate the article for seven days. <sup>51</sup> On the seventh day he is to examine it, and if the mold has spread in the fabric, the woven or knitted material, or the leather, whatever its use, it is a persistent defiling mold; the article is unclean. <sup>52</sup> He must burn the fabric, the woven or knitted material of wool or linen, or any leather article that has been spoiled; because the defiling mold is persistent, the article must be burned. <sup>53</sup> “But if, when the priest examines it, the mold has not spread in the fabric, the woven or knitted material, or the leather article, <sup>54</sup> he shall order that the spoiled article be washed. Then he is to isolate it for another seven days. <sup>55</sup> After the article has been washed, the priest is to examine it again, and if the mold has not changed its appearance, even though it has not spread, it is unclean. Burn it, no matter which side of the fabric has been spoiled. <sup>56</sup> If, when the priest examines it, the mold has faded after the article has been washed, he is to tear the spoiled part out of the fabric, the leather, or the woven or knitted material.

## Ezekiel 45:18-20

<sup>18</sup> Thus says the Eternal God: In the first month, on the first day of the month, you must take an unblemished young bull and purify the sanctuary. <sup>19</sup> The priest will take some of the blood of the sin offering and place it on the doorpost of the temple, on the four corners of the ledge of the altar, and on the doorpost of the gate of the inner court. <sup>20</sup> This is what you must do on the seventh day of the month for anyone who sins inadvertently or through ignorance; so you will make atonement for the temple.
