Creativity and Judaism


Judaism teaches that each of us is endowed with creative capacity simply by being human

hat is creativity? Creativity can be difficult to define. Often when asked, people come up with examples of creativity or name creative people, but a specific definition is a little more difficult to solicit. Dictionaries and websites have different wording, but at its core, creativity is the ability to turn new and imaginative ideas into reality. Notice that first and foremost it is an ability. It's something that can be learned, honed, and perfected. Second, it's something that requires a certain amount of risk. In order to be creative, you need to be able to view things in new ways or from a different perspective.

Judaism has a long history of creativity. The first three words of the Torah are *B'resheit bara Elohim* — "In the beginning, God created." God's first act is one of creativity. Only a few verses later we read that humans are created *b'tzelem Elohim* ("in the image of God"). If God is, first and foremost, a creator, and we are created in God's image, then we too are created to be creators. Each of us is endowed with creative capacity simply by being human.

At first glance, a religion based on a series of laws and commandments would seem to be restrictive and static. However,



Jews have long worked to find creative ways within our structure. More than 2000 years ago, while the Second Temple still stood in Jerusalem, various groups of Jews became dissatisfied with the way the priests were running things. They began to experiment with other ways of worship, one of which was Rabbinic Judaism. After the destruction of the Temple, this "experiment" eventually transformed Jewish practice. What was once an idea became the norm.

Jews are taught from an early age to explore and question. From the time a child learns the *Sh'ma* until her Bat Mitzvah and beyond, she is encouraged to think and learn, to create through whichever medium is comfortable. In our Family Services here at Schaarai Zedek, we ask our students to learn about the service prayers and then to create expressions

of their learning through word, song, or the visual arts. We want them to explore ideas and to express them in different ways.

I can hear many of you thinking, "I'm not creative! I can't draw, sing, sew, write, etc." While it's true that we often think of creativity as associated with the arts, creativity does not only express itself through the arts. Each one of us is blessed with a different ability or talent. Perhaps it's that particular spice you add to your famous stew, that particular way your colleague has of getting people to work together, or your neighbor's ability to handle children. Creativity shows up in all aspects of life.

Schaarai Zedek continues the tradition of questioning and creating through our Adult Education classes. You can see all our upcoming events on our calendar, but I want to draw your attention to two particular events.

"Phishing" for Courage

et me start by saying to all of you that I will never email you asking for gift cards. For those who don't know the context, let me explain. Over the past two years, many pastors, rabbis, and even a temple president or two have been "spoofed," meaning an email is made to appear as if it came from them, using a fake email address that's just close enough to get by.

So you may have received an email from rabbijoellllsimon@gmail.com, rabbi.zedek@gmail.com, or templerabbi018@gmail.com (they got lazy the last time) with the subject "SHALOM ALEICHEM" that said something like:

"Hello How Are You? I Need An Assistance From You? Please Let Me Know If You Get This, Shalom, Rabbi Joel."

If you weren't bothered by "an assistance" or the capital letters beginning each word, and you replied, you received a second email asking for eBay gift cards to help "some women going through cancer at the hospital" saying that I was in a meeting and "I can't pick calls now."

Luckily at this point, most recognized that these e-mails didn't sound like me and reached out to me directly before making any purchases. But as scammers are trying to take advantage of our congregants' generosity, they fall in a long line of "phishing" (e-mails), "vishing" (phone calls) and "smishing" (text messages) in which someone pretending to be someone else asks for money or sensitive information. And no, the IRS will not call you asking for your

social security number, Netflix or AT&T will not text you, offering a free month or a special gift if you click a strange looking link, and the Prince of Ethiopia is not looking at you to be a business partner in his next big venture.

Believe it or not, at least according to the Rabbis of the Talmud, these scammers have a lot in common with the pig. While there are many animals that the Torah does not permit to be eaten, the pig seems to get more negative attention than any of them in later commentaries. Here's why... For a land animal to be kosher, it must chew its cud and have cloven hooves. All the other animals that are not kosher camels, rabbits, horses etc... - whether or not they chew their cud, none of them have cloven hooves. So, just by looking at the animal, you know it's not kosher. But the pig looks kosher. While it doesn't chew its cud, it has cloven hooves. And at least according to Rabbi Hisda in the Talmud, it is the only animal that is so. The pig is viewed with disdain because it is pretending to be something it is not.

From this interpretation, we learn an important lesson of being honest about who we are, but as we prepare for our two Spring holidays, Purim and Passover, we see two of our people's heroes, in very different ways, pretending to be someone they are not. Esther must pretend not to be Jewish, earning a place in the King's palace from which she could save her people. Moses, on the other hand, was a shy shepherd with a stutter, hoping to hide in the wilderness far away from the world, but in order to save his people he had to play the role of leader, hiding his

reluctance and anxiety as he did.

Both Moses and Esther were forced to hide parts of themselves as a result of threats to our people. As I write this article at the end of January, we have seen swastikas graffitied at two of our local schools, and this past weekend, community members driving home from Orlando on I-4 had to drive under a neo-Nazi demonstration on an overpass. These events bookended Rabbi Charlie Cytron Walker and three congregants being taken hostage at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, TX. Unfortunately, I expect that there will be more events like this between now and the time we go to print.

It would be easy for us to want to hide our Judaism like Esther in an attempt to protect ourselves from perceived danger. But the amazing thing about Moses is that when he "hid" his fear, "pretending" to be a leader, he wasn't scamming anyone. His pretending only brought out the strength that was already in him, and he quickly began to live to his full potential. The hatred surrounding us should not cause us to hide who we are, but rather challenge us to be our best selves, living our Jewish values proudly, strengthening ourselves, our families, and our community as a result.

We can't control the ways in which others hide behind scams or hatred, but we can control the way in which we respond (or in the case of scams - ignore), and most importantly, we can control the people we are, so we are proud of who we are, both inside and out.

t seems that there are many names for Religious School. I have heard it called Sunday School, Hebrew School, and even "time to go to brunch." Here at Schaarai Zedek, we are officially called the Flom Religious School, and we do so much more than teach religion. Check out everything that students are learning on Sunday morning:

Not just learning, but doing: Our students are not just learning about Jewish values, holidays, and rituals, but actively participating in them. Through our student-led services and holiday center days, we are creating students who are actively engaged in their Judaism. Coming up, we welcome our youngest group, our kindergartners and first graders, to lead our Shabbat Service on March 11. Our sixth

graders lead on April 8.

Bringing values home: We know that we can share a lot here on Sundays, but the real connection to Judaism happens at home. We do this by sending home as many resources as we can to make it easy for families to continue the conversation. This is especially important during the b'nai mitzvah year, and we have been engaging the entire family with our family b'nai mitzvah programs. Our next meeting will take place on April 7, and will focus on creating a relationship with prayer and God.

Creating a positive Jewish environment: We want our students to WANT to be at Religious School. We are always looking for people who want to make an impact on our students and are currently hiring teachers. Our teachers are paid per session and lesson plans are provided. We are also looking for specialist and elective teachers. Please contact me if you're interested.

And Hebrew! Did you know that we begin teaching Hebrew in first grade? Students learn one letter a week during their first-grade year and begin putting words together by second grade. In third grade, our students start learning how to decode, and by fourth grade, they are reading prayers, using games to help them retain what they know. In seventh and eighth grades, students can choose to continue their journey with Modern Hebrew.

No matter what you call it, we are having a lot of fun on Sunday mornings! See you at Religious School!

Purim's Origins

With celebrations including costumes, skits and songs, noisemakers, and gifts of food, Purim is definitely full of fun! Purim is a joyous holiday that affirms and celebrates Jewish survival and continuity throughout history. The main communal celebration involves a public reading—usually in the synagogue—of the Book of Esther, which tells the story of the holiday: Under the rule of King Ahashverosh, Haman, the king's adviser, plots to exterminate all of the Jews of Persia. His plan is foiled by Queen Esther and her cousin Mordechai, who ultimately save the Jews of Persia from destruction. The reading of the megillah typically is a rowdy affair, punctuated by booing and noise-making when Haman's name is read aloud.

Purim is an unusual holiday in many respects. First, the Book of Esther is the only biblical book in which God is not mentioned. Second, Purim, like Chanukah, is viewed as a minor festival according to Jewish custom, but has been elevated to a major holiday as a result of the Jewish historical experience. Over the centuries, Haman has come to symbolize every antisemite in every land where Jews were oppressed. The significance of Purim lies not so much in how it began, but in what it has become: a thankful and joyous affirmation of Jewish survival.

Pesach: Festival Of Freedom

Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) is a major Jewish spring festival celebrating freedom and family as we remember the Exodus from Egypt more than 3,000 years ago.

The Story of Passover

Passover, the Festival of Freedom, tells the story of the children of Israel and their escape from slavery in Egypt. This has been such an important part of our history that the Ten Commandments opens with the declaration:

I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery. (Exodus 20:2)

During the many years of our history, Jews have found hope and strength through the Festival of Freedom and the story of Passover. In ancient history, the pastoral tribes of Israel observed a shepherd festival called Hag HaPesah, which referred to the skipping of the lambs. This name gained new meaning when God passed over the houses of the Children of Israel as he smote the Egyptians (Exodus 12:27).

It was after the destruction of the Temple in the year 70 that the celebration of the Passover Holiday became centered in the home. The home is the center of the Jewish way of life, and it reflects the special nature of the Passover week. It is the

time of "spring cleaning" and of different foods, dishes, and utensils.

A ceremony of removing *chametz*, or food that has been leavened, is a wonderful family activity. The search for leaven, b'dikat chametz, signifies that the home is now ready for Passover. At various places in the home, a parent hides pieces of bread. In the dark, children with flashlights search them out and gather them together for disposal. The disposal of *chametz* is accompanied by brief prayer:

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al biur chametz.

Blessed are You, our God, Ruler of the world, who sanctifies us with mitzvot and calls upon us to remove chametz.

The Haggadah is the book that presents the home service, the Seder, which means the "order" of service. The purpose of the Haggadah is so that parents can fulfill their responsibility to tell their children about the miracle of being delivered from Egyptian bondage. The person who conducts the Seder should plan ahead of time. Each person should have a Haggadah and

participate in the reading and telling of the story of Passover.

The Passover Symbols

The seder plate holds ritual foods used throughout the Passover Seder. Each item on a seder plate is a symbol of the Exodus story and helps participants at the seder retell the story each year. These items are:

- Beitzah: The roasted egg is symbolic of the festival sacrifice made in biblical times. It is also a symbol of spring, the season in which Passover is always celebrated.
- Maror: Bitter herbs (usually horseradish) symbolize the bitterness of Egyptian slavery. The maror is often dipped in charoset to reduce its sharpness. Maror is used in the seder because of the commandment (in Numbers 9:11) to eat the paschal lamb "with unleavened bread and bitter herbs."
- *Chazeret*: Lettuce is often used in addition to the maror as a bitter herb. The authorities are divided on the requirement of chazeret, so not all

- communities use it. Since the commandment (in Numbers 9:11) to eat the paschal lamb "with unleavened bread and bitter herbs" uses the plural ("bitter herbs") most seder plates have a place for chazeret.
- **Zeroa:** The shank bone is symbolic of the Paschal lamb offered as the Passover sacrifice in biblical times. Some communities use a chicken neck as a substitute. Vegetarian households may use beets.
- Charoset: This mixture (often apple, nuts, and spices ground together and mixed with wine) are symbolic of the mortar used by Hebrew slaves to build Egyptian structures. There are several variations in the recipe for charoset; the Mishnah describes a mixture of fruits, nuts, and vinegar.
- *Karpas:* Parsley is dipped into salt water during the seder. The salt water serves as a reminder of the tears shed during Egyptian slavery.
- *Matzah:* Perhaps the most important symbol on the seder table is a plate that has a stack of three pieces of matzah. Some say they represent the Kohen class (the Jewish priests in ancient times), the Levis (who supported the priests), and the Israelites (the rest of the Jews).
- *Wine (or grape juice):* Everyone at the seder has a (usually very small) cup or glass from which they drink

four cups of wine. Traditionally, the four cups represent the four biblical promises of redemption: "I will bring you out from under the burdens of the Egyptians, and I will rid you from their slavery, and I will redeem you with an outstretched arm, and with great judgments. And I will take you to me for a people . . ." Others say the four cups represent the four letters in the unspeakable Name of God.

Optional social justice additions: Passover offers a variety of opportunities to infuse our holiday celebrations with social justice themes, including a number of modern additions to consider adding to your seder plate.

Tradition does not dictate the shape or size of the seder plate. Many families purchase one of the beautifully artistic seder plates made in Israel, but it may be round or square, plain or ornate.

Passover Food Guide

The following foods are to be avoided during Passover: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, and foods derived from wheat, corn, barley, oats, dried peas, and dried beans.

Foods requiring no "Kosher L'Pesach" label include natural coffee, tea, sugar, salt, pepper, vegetables (except peas and beans, string beans being permitted.) Certainly, all foods bearing a label are permissible.

Passover Songs

The Passover seder is a wonderful time for family, delicious food, and joyous banter. But also — and let's get real second — for kids, the seder can also feel really long. Fortunately, built right into the seder are fun songs that really liven things up.

Creativity and Judaism continued from front page
