Additionally, we are excited to expand our offerings for adults who do not rely on childcare to engage in learning and social opportunities. We welcome feedback on the time of day, days of the week, programming content, and other thoughts you might have to expand these offerings.

Before the end of our program year,

we are also excited to explore more options for adults with flexibility during the traditional workday. We would like to offer museum tours, light hikes, lunches around our Tampa Bay area, and learning opportunities at Congregation Schaarai Zedek and with experts around town. As we build more offerings, we hope you will be able to find programming options that are both comfortably familiar while also pushing you slightly outside your comfort zone.

As we unroll these new options, we invite feedback and would love to hear your thoughts on the new options we are sharing for this community. We also know that there will be more well-received opportunities than anticipated. As always, my door is open, and my email and phone are ready to receive suggestions! We hope something you see in the pages of this Shofar brings you in soon, and we don't have to wait until "after the holidays" to see you!

Children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult. Plant vegetables for Afghan clients of Gulf Coast Jewish Family and Community Services.

11. Fueling Hope

Ages 5+. 9:30 to 10:15 AM and 10:30 to 11:15 AM. Make sandwiches for people experiencing homelessness. This project is at Schaarai Zedek or can be done at home.

12. Gulf Coast Jewish Family and Community Services Cards (GCJFCS)

Create cards for volunteers, elders, refugees, and GCJFCS clients. This project is at Schaarai Zedek.

13. Judeo-Christian Health Clinic

Ages 10+. Spruce up furniture at this community health clinic.

14. Keep Tampa Bay Beautiful

Children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult. Help beautify Davis Islands community park by picking up litter.

15. Kennedy Cares Tampa Bay

Teens and older. Organize shelves; help with toy drive.

16. Kindness Rocks & Posters

Ages 5+. Decorate rocks and make posters to distribute in your community to inspire others. This project is at Schaarai Zedek.

17. MacDonald Training Center

Prepare the art gallery for a special event.

18. Metropolitan Ministries

Ages 8+. Volunteer with the Environmental Services team to keep the campus clean. Volunteers may also prep food and clean the kitchen.

Ages 16+, 8:30 to 10:30 AM. Serve guests a nutritious, hot, sit-down meal. Volunteers will assume the role of restaurant "waitstaff" including serving, bussing tables, hosting tables, and other restaurant tasks.

23. Unaccompanied Children Center (GCJFCS)

Teens & adults. Craft and play games with the children. The UAC has up to 50 children, mostly Spanish-speaking.

24. Veterans Administration

Ages 5+. Create a craft and cards for veterans. This project is at Schaarai Zedek.

25. Vista Gardens Park in Carrollwood

Weed, mulch, make signs, and other gardening tasks.

26. Warming the World

Religious School

his year boasts the largest Religious School Congregation Schaarai Zedek has ever seen, which is saying something, given that even a "normal" year for us is still quite large! Our enrollment is a testament to the community here at CSZ, a community I am proud to be a part of. Recently, we re-launched our Gesher L'Mishpacha program, the "Bridge to the Family."

Often referred to as "Gesher," the program offers nearly 60 opportunities for families to bridge what happens at Religious School with their own homes. Families are asked to complete 18 of the challenges to achieve *Gesher* status. Those that complete the program are celebrated at a Friday night Shabbat service and honored with a plaque in the Religious School hallway.

In partnership with the clergy, we have re-developed nearly 60 ways to bring Religious School home in a meaningful way. From attending High Holy Day services (if you did that, mark it off!) to visiting a Jewish Museum or historic site on vacation, Gesher is about building an even stronger relationship with CSZ.

But *Gesher* isn't something that needs to be done alone. We've also opened a Facebook group for families to share how they fulfill Gesher tasks. Community is what makes CSZ such a special place, and it's something I'd like to continue to build on together.

You'll notice that I actively have avoided calling Religious School "Sunday School." Yes, it takes place on Sunday, and it is school, but Religious School is more than what happens each Sunday inside the building. Religious School is when you listen to an awesome Chanukah Spotify playlist. It's when you make matzo ball soup together as a family. It's when you listen to a CSZ Podcast episode together (yeah, we have those!). Religious School is building a photo album for a Jewish lifecycle event and retelling your favorite memories. And when you do these things, that's Gesher, a

Congregation Schaarai Zedek. Consider the relationship you and your child will have with Judaism and CSZ after purposefully completing 18 of the tasks listed in the Gesher program. How much more confident will your child be in their Judaism amongst peers after this? How many memories with your child will you build through this program? And how excited will they be to attend Religious School as a student and later as a Teacher Assistant when what they're learning becomes part of their home?

The Gesher program concludes for the year in May 2023. I am challenging you, the largest Religious School CSZ has ever seen, to have the most extensive Gesher participation CSZ has ever seen. I am challenging you to complete 18 tasks before the end of May. That's three (or so) tasks each month. And really, who doesn't love some homemade matzo ball soup? If you're interested in getting started, I've listed some options below. You can find the complete program on our website (www.zedek.org/religiousschool/ gesher-lmishpacha/), the Schmooze, and our Facebook page (facebook.com/ groups/1095600204678501).

I look forward to celebrating all of you and the bridges you built completing this year's Gesher L'Mishpacha program.

Examples of Gesher L'Mishpacha Activities:

- Attend Shabbat morning Torah Study/ Bagel Minyan as a family.
- Learn about a famous Jewish person through a movie or book. Post what you learned about them in the Gesher Facebook group thread for this task!
- Find out about the person for whom you were named. If he/she were a biblical character, what traits would you want to "inherit"?
- Add two Jewish books to your home library and read them together as a family. (Check out the Schmooze "Book of the Week" section for suggestions!)
- Create a family prayer to include in your Shabbat observance. You can even illustrate it and put it up somewhere in your home!
- Participate in your grade's Student-Led Family Shabbat Service.
- Make a Jewish ritual object and use it as a family (challah cover, matzah cover, etc.).
- **Experience Chanukah by lighting** candles at home and/or attending the Schaarai Zedek Family Chanukah Service.
- Create your own family Tzedakah box and fill it each Shabbat with coins. Donate these funds to the family's favorite tzedakah.

The Torah is Our Playground

f you've ever found yourself in the Shimberg Grand Foyer on a Thursday at 11 o'clock, there's a good chance you'll hear me cracking up in my office. Just about every week, that's when I engage in havruta, studying with a partner, with a good friend and colleague from rabbinical school. What could be so downright hilarious? Well, it's Torah study! Torah is, of course, our scripture, our Holy Book, our sacred text or any other synonym that makes it sound untouchable. "This is a book infused with divine inspiration. It must be treated with utmost seriousness," the fuddy-duddies protest. I'll make a case for the opposition. As seriously as we take the Torah with regards to the extent that it shapes our lives, our sacred texts do not always take themselves seriously and the rabbis, those scholars that shaped Judaism into what it is today, had more fun "playing" with the text, than we might imagine.

Humor is an essential part of the human experience and the Torah, as literature written by humans, is no exception. The people of Israel complain in the wilderness about having no meat. Moses says that they'll have meat up to their noses and God sends a flock of quails that covers the land up to six feet. This is both ironic and absurd once you picture it!

In the book of Samuel, the Israelites' enemies, the Philistines, steal the Ark of the Covenant from the Temple and every city they bring it to is struck with hemorrhoids. To appease the Israelites and their God, the Philistines send back the Ark along with five golden statues of their buttocks. Think about what this says about the sensibilities of the Philistines. They are not a group to be taken seriously. Aside from that, toilet humor? In my *Tanakh*? Absolutely!

And the rabbis had wonderful senses of humor. In the passage that had my friend and me cracking up a few weeks ago from the Babylonian Talmud, Tractate *Megillah* 25b, the rabbis tell us that all mockery of idolaters is permitted. In fact, one is allowed to say to an idolater, "Take your idol and put it in your *shin tav*," that being a colorful euphemism for buttocks. I'm not a professional comedian but I'm fairly certain this is meant to be funny.

Indeed, the rabbis tell us that our study of Torah and Jewish text is meant to be joyful, playful, and creative. The qualification for being allowed on the ancient *Sanhedrin* was to use the Torah to prove a snake kosher. Some of our most beloved commentators are those who take on contrary opinions as a game, showing off their mastery of Jewish law texts.

There are times, like the Days of Awe, that we are meant to take things seriously, but at every other turn, our tradition is begging us to engage with it in a way that is irreverent and enjoyable. The greatest story in the Jewish tradition, humorous or otherwise, the Oven of Akhnai, imagines God intervening in an argument between rabbis only to be told to stay out of it! And what is God's response? God, the butt of this joke, laughs to God's self. This tradition has been given to us and so, we have permission to find as much joy and humor in it as God does. And when we enjoy our study of Torah, it will only make us want to learn more and more. So let us take in this great lesson from our tradition: laughing a little can help us learn a lot!

Chanukah Festival of Lights Home Guide

First Chanukah Candle: Sunday, December 18 **Eighth Chanukah Candle: Sunday, December 25**

hanukah, the Feast of Rededication, lasts for eight days ■ and begins on the twenty-fifth of Kislev. Light the first candle this year on December 18. The "Rededication" refers to the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem in 165 BCE. This festival came after victory was attained by the small forces of Judah Maccabee over army detachments sent by King Antiochus of Syria. Antiochus had attempted to force foreign worship (the Hellenistic-Oriental worship of Zeus) on the Jewish people. This was part of his strategy to unite his subjugated nations for a final war with Rome. Most of the Iews assimilated and accepted Antiochus' demands. But the Maccabees would not assimilate. That small band achieved the spiritual victory of remaining Jews and the military victory of defeating the Syrian Greeks.

The story of Chanukah is not found in the Bible but in the Apocryphal book of Maccabees, part of our post-Biblical Jewish literature.

We celebrate Chanukah because some of our ancestors would not give up their Judaism. If it had not been for them, Judaism likely would have disappeared. If we do not continue with our traditions, assimilation will overtake us in our own day. We remember the courage of the Maccabees as we light our menorahs and celebrate our story of survival.

Chanukah Blessings (to be recited and/or sung each night)

Light the shamash (helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Chaunukah lights. As you do, say or sing:

בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשָׁנוּ בָּמִצִוֹתָיו, וִצְנֵנוּ לְהַדְלִיק גֵר שׁל חַנֻכָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Chanukah.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

בַּרוּךְ אַתַּה יִיַ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶךְ הַעוֹלַם, שֵעשַה נִסִים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ וָאָמוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הָהֶם בַּזְּמַן הַזֶּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim baz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wondrous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

Shehecheyanu prayer, for the first night only:

בַּרוּדְ אַתַּה יִיַ אַלֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶדְ הַעוֹלַם, שַהַחֵינוּ וְקִיּמַנוּ והגיענו לזמן הזה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higiyanu laz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who has kept us alive, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

The *shamash* candle (servant candle) is used only to light the other candles. The individual candles are put in place starting with the right-hand side of the Menorah. The shamash is lit first. Then the candles are lighted from left to right, i.e., the last one placed in the Menorah is the first to be lit. One on the first evening; two on the second, until the eighth night of Chanukah eight candles are lit.

The Chanukah candles must bum for at least half an hour each night. On Friday eve, the Chanukah lights are kindled before the Sabbath lights. As the lights are lit, the blessings are sung or recited.

"Maoz Tzur" ("Rock of Ages")

Maoz tzur y'shuati I'cha naeh I'shabeach Tikon beit t'filati y'sham todah n'zabeach. Rock of Ages let our song, Praise thy saving power; Thou amidst the raging foes, Wast our sheltering tower.

L'eit tachin matbeach mitzar hamnabeach Az egmor b'shir mizmor chanukat hamizbeach Az egmor b'shir mizmor chanukat hamizbeach. Furiously they assailed us, But Thine arm availed us And Thy word broke their sword, When our own strength failed us. And Thy word broke their sword, When our own strength failed us.

Chanukah Candle Lighting Daily Readings

Read after menorah is lit:

First Night: We light the candle for the first night of Chanukah as a dedication to kindness, *hesed*. Let us always be kind to other people and animals by trying to understand their feelings and by helping them. This will help make us and the whole world more compassionate.

Second Night: We light the candle for the second night of Chanukah as a dedication to fairness, *tsedeq*. Let us always be fair to others by sharing with them and treating them with respect. This will help fill the world with justice.

Third Night: We light the candle for the third night of Chanukah as a dedication to love and friendship. Let us always be thankful for the love of our family and friends. From the roots of their affections, we help fill the world with love, 'ahavah.

Fourth Night: We light the candle for the fourth night of Chanukah as a dedication to each of us being a good, responsible citizen of our community and of the world. Let us always work to improve our school and our neighborhood, and also contribute to help others in places farther away. We are all human and all family, mishpacha.

Fifth Night: We light the candle for the fifth night of Chanukah as a dedication to freedom, herut. Like many other people, our ancestors struggled many times for freedom. So let us value the liberties and opportunities such struggles have allowed us to enjoy, and let us work together to help others who are less free. This will help fill the world with freedom.

Sixth Night: We light the candle for the sixth night of Chanukah as a dedication to peace, *shalom*. Chanukah was first celebrated after a battle as our ancestors began to rebuild after the destruction and suffering and death caused by war. Every day, we can help rebuild the world with peace with our Chanukah values - by being kind and fair, loving and responsible, and by helping to spread freedom.

Seventh Night: We light the candle for the seventh night of Chanukah as a dedication to life. We can help all to enjoy a good life by working together to create a world of compassion and justice, a world of love and mutual responsibility, a world of freedom and peace. As we hope and work for these ideals, we dedicate this Chanukah candle "to life" - *l'-haiyim*!

Eighth Night: We light the candle for the eighth night of Chanukah as a dedication to the improvement of the world, *tikkun-olam*. May our dedication to our Chanukah goals inspire us and light our way all year round. Each and every day, may we help to heal the world's suffering and sickness, to repair its brokenness, and to help create what in Yiddish we call *a shenere un besere velt*, "a better and more beautiful world."





The Americanization of Chanukah

How embracing assimilation is an expression of our Judaism

on't ask why an eight-year-old was watching Saturday Night Live, but I will never forget Saturday night, December 16, 1989, when I saw Chanukah on television for the first time.

The skit featured "Hanukkah Harry," a character played by Jon Lovitz. Hanukkah Harry was the Jewish equivalent to Santa Claus who saved Christmas when Santa Claus fell ill; instead of games and toys, however, he delivered slacks and socks to all the worlds' children. (The slacks are a little big, but you'll grow into them...)

I don't know that Hanukkah Harry was, in fact, the first time that Chanukah appeared on television, but it's the first time I remember, and while the skit presented problems beyond the stereotypes, as a child, none of that

mattered. Since then, Chanukah would make its way onto a handful of shows - the Rugrats Chanukah special, Adam Sandler's Chanukah Song (again on Saturday Night Live), Friends' "Holiday Armadillo," and the Nanny's "Chanukah Story" (featuring Ray Charles...) are only a few. Chanukah has increasingly become part of the American winter experience since Jon Lovitz first donned his blue and white floppy hat, and while some Christians may be concerned about the loss of religion in Christmas as a consequence of its "Americanization," one need not have the same concern with Chanukah.

The historical basis of Chanukah, and in my opinion, a story far more important than one day's worth of oil lasting for eight days, is the Maccabees' defeat over the Syrian Greeks who had forced the Jews to give up their religion in order to assimilate into Greek culture. Under Antiochus IV Epiphanes' rule, all Jewish ritual observance was punishable by death, and the Temple was desecrated into a place of worship for Greek gods. After the Maccabees' victory, the Temple was rededicated and Jewish practice was restored.

We could, of course, be understandably troubled by the irony of a holiday celebrating our overcoming a forced assimilation becoming our most assimilated holiday, but I think the Rabbis of the Talmud would celebrate the Chanukah specials on TV, the menorah next to the Christmas tree at the mall, and even ugly Chanukah sweaters. In the Babylonian Talmud (Shabbat 21a), we read:

Our Rabbis taught: It is incumbent to place the Chanukah lamp by the door of one's house on the outside; if one dwells in an upper chamber, it is placed at the window nearest the street.

An essential part of Chanukah's observance is making that observance

public. We are free to be Jewish, and putting our Chanukah menorah in a place where our neighbors and passersby will see it, publicizing our Judaism and our pride of that Judaism, is the perfect expression of the freedom. And if you think about it, it makes quite a bit of sense. How do we commemorate a holiday that celebrates our ability to freely be Jews? We shout out to the world, "We're Jewish!"

There's one more important piece of Chanukah for us to understand. Many Jews at the time were happy to give up their religion in exchange for acceptance. Ultimately, the Maccabees fought against them as well. The Maccabees were zealots who would not have been fans of our American Reform Judaism, as we embrace our assimilation into the modern world, but that is exactly what we can focus

on in our celebration of Chanukah. We don't have to give up our religion to embrace modernity; in fact, embracing modernity is an expression of our Judaism, and Chanukah can be a holiday that celebrates that as well.

So whether sharing the Chanukah story at your child's school, bringing Chanukah cookies to the company Christmas party, or yes, even wearing that ugly Chanukah sweater, this is a time in which we can be proud of our traditions and share them with the non-Jewish world. As we strive to be a light unto the nations, may our Chanukah lights shine bright this year. May that light help to build bridges of understanding, and may we be that much closer to a time when all peoples can live together in peace.

Chanukah Music

For many families and communities, singing is a particularly joyous part of Chanukah celebrations. There are many traditional and contemporary songs for the holiday, and videos and recordings are widely available online.

"Maoz Tzur" ("Rock of Ages") is customarily sung after the lighting of the candles each night, and at other times throughout the holiday. It was composed in Europe in the 12th or 13th century.

"I Have a Little Dreidel" is a modern-day children's song frequently sung during the Festival of Lights. Other holiday favorites include "Chanukah, Oh Chanukah;" "Sivivon, sov, sov," a Hebrew folksong; "Light One Candle," written by Peter Yarrow; and "The Latke Song," by Debbie Friedman, z'l, the renowned Jewish singer and songwriter.

How to Play Dreidel

Dreidel is the traditional game played to celebrate Chanukah. The letters on the dreidel—nun, gimel, hei, and shin—are interpreted to stand for the first letter

of each word in the Hebrew statement Neis gadol hayah sham, which means, "A great miracle happened there" and refers to the defeat of the Syrian army and the re-dedication of the Temple in the story of Chanukah. In Israel, one letter on the dreidel differs from those used in the rest of the world. Instead of a shin, you will find the letter pei, transforming the Hebrew statement into Neis gadol hayah po, which means, "A great miracle happened here."

Distribute an equal number of playing pieces to each person. Begin by having each of the players put one or two pieces into a common pot. Take turns spinning the dreidel and taking the actions determined by the letter you spin:

Nun: The player takes nothing. Gimel: The player takes all. Hei: The player takes half. Shin: The player puts in.

The winner is the person who collects all the playing pieces.

You may also try playing the dreidel game with a charitable twist: Everyone puts some money in the kitty, and the winner gets to choose where to donate.


