Genesis 50:15-26

¹⁵ When Joseph's brothers saw that their father was dead, they said, "Perhaps Joseph will hate us and will certainly pay us back for all the wrong we did to him." ¹⁶ So they sent a message to Joseph, saying, "Your father gave this command before he died: ¹⁷ 'Say to Joseph, "I beg you, forgive the transgressions of your brothers and their sin. For they did evil to you."' Now, please forgive the transgressions of the servants of the God of your father." And Joseph wept when they spoke to him. ¹⁸ Then his brothers also went and fell down before his face and said, "We are your servants." ¹⁹ Joseph said to them, "Do not be afraid, for I am in the place of God. ²⁰ But as for you, you intended to harm me, but Adonai intended it for good, in order to bring it about as it is this day, to save many lives. ²¹ So now, do not fear. I will provide for you and your little ones." So he comforted them and spoke kindly to them. ²² Joseph stayed in Egypt, he and his father's household, and Joseph lived one hundred and ten years. ²³ Joseph saw Ephraim's children to the third generation. Also, the children of Makir, the son of Manasseh, were brought up on Joseph's knees. ²⁴ Joseph said to his brothers, "I am about to die. Adonai will surely come to you and bring you out of this land to the land of which God swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob." ²⁵ Then Joseph made the sons of Israel swear, saying, "Adonai will surely visit you, and you shall carry up my bones from here." ²⁶ So Joseph died at the age of one hundred and ten years old, and they embalmed him, and he was put in a coffin in Egypt.

1 Kings 2:1-4

¹ Now it was coming close to the day of David's death, and he gave his son Solomon a charge, saying: ² "I am going the way of all the earth. Be strong, and show yourself to be a man. ³ And keep the charge of Adonai your God, walking in God's ways, keeping God's statutes, Adonai's commandments, God's judgments, and Adonai's testimonies, as it is written in the Law of Moses, that you may prosper in all that you do and wherever you turn, ⁴ that Adonai may carry out God's word that Adonai spoke concerning me, saying, 'If your children take heed to their way, to walk before Me in faithfulness with all their hearts and with all their souls, you shall not fail to have a man on the throne of Israel.'

Welcome to Congregation Schaarai Zedek's Saturday morning Shabbat service. Shabbat, the Jewish Sabbath, begins on Friday evening at dusk and concludes when there are three stars in the sky on Saturday evening.
