Genesis 1:1-13

¹ When God was about to create heaven and earth, ² the earth was a chaos, unformed, and on the face of the chaotic waters there was darkness. Then God's spirit glided over the face of the waters, ³ and God said, "Let there be light" - and there was light! ⁴ And when God saw how good the light was, God divided the light from the darkness; ⁵ God then called the light Day, and called the darkness Night, and there was evening and there was morning, the first day. ⁶ God then said, "Let there be an expanse in the midst of the waters, and let it divide water from water!" ⁷ So God made the expanse, separating the waters beneath the expanse from the waters above the expanse - and so it was. ⁸ God then called the expanse Sky, and there was evening and there was morning, a second day. ⁹ God then said, "Let the waters beneath the sky be collected in one place, so that the dry ground may be seen!" - and so it was. ¹⁰ And God called the dry ground Earth, and called the collected waters Seas. And when God saw how good it was, ¹¹ God said, "Let the earth grow vegetation, seed-bearing plants, fruit trees on the earth that bear fruit, each true to its type, with its seed in it!" - and so it was. ¹² The earth brought forth vegetation, seed-bearing plants, each true to its type and trees bearing fruit, each true to its type, with its seed in it. And God saw how good it was, ¹³ and there was evening and there was morning, a third day.

Isaiah 42:5-6

⁵ Thus says Adonai, God who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread forth the earth and that which comes out of it, who gives breath to the people on it, and spirit to those who walk in it: ⁶ I, Adonai, have called you in righteousness, and will hold your hand, and will keep you and appoint you for a covenant of the people, for a light of the nations, ⁷ to open the blind eyes, to bring out the prisoners from the prison, and those who sit in darkness out of the prison house.

Welcome to Congregation Schaarai Zedek's Saturday morning Shabbat service. Shabbat, the Jewish Sabbath, begins on Friday evening at dusk and concludes when there are three stars in the sky on Saturday evening. While Shabbat is a day of rest, our community joins in worship celebrating the themes of creation and God's original redemption of the Israelites from Egypt.
