Why Is This Student Different from All Other Students?

y dad didn't pick me up from school often. but that's only part of the reason why I have such a vivid memory of the spring day during my kindergarten

year when he picked me up early. I walked to the car, so proud to share the bread we had baked in class as part of our lesson on Native American culture. I was chewing as I got into the car, and before I could share how we had made the bread, my dad looked at me in the backseat and said, "Joel, do you remember what we did last night?" As I immediately remembered singing "Mah Nishtana" and spending the evening talking about why for seven days we would eat only matzah, my pride quickly turned to shame. Before I could start crying, my dad told me that he had

forgotten about Passover a few years prior and eaten a sandwich at a catered work event before someone asked, "Ron, isn't it Passover?" As my dad humanized the moment, he also lovingly told me that the challenges of being a Jewish minority, even in the most understanding of circumstances, would always be with me.

I was reminded of this story when I saw a notice from my children's elementary school this year that on April 6, the day after our Passover Seder, there would be donuts in the courtyard for all of the kids as they headed into class. I was sure the scheduling had been unintentional, but I sent the school a note. Of course, I said, I didn't expect them to cancel something that had already been publicized, but I wanted to make sure it was considered for similar events in the future. I couldn't have been more pleased with the response. I received a response within minutes that the date had been overlooked, and they were going to add a table with Passover desserts so those students who weren't eating donuts would also be able to have a sweet treat as they headed into school.

The conversation I would have with my first grader and kindergartner was more or less the same - there are going to be times in which it's hard to be Jewish. times when we see others doing things that we wish we could do. They are occasionally going to have to walk past donuts even though they want one, but the fact that the school made an effort showed an understanding that allowed being part of a minority to be something they could be proud of.

One of the calls I receive most at the beginning of the school year is from parents of students whose teachers or coaches are not showing that same understanding about Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The thing is, like the donuts in my children's school courtyard, most of the time, this is an oversight and can be changed or at least adjusted. We have an arrangement with the school district that no major exams or extracurricular activities should be scheduled on Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur, those days are not counted as absences, and there should be no penalty for missing those days, but the best thing is for you or your child to let your teachers/coaches know as early as possible to help them ensure this is the case. (This year, Rosh Hashanah beings the evening of Friday, September 15, and continues Saturday, September 16. Yom Kippur begins the evening of Sunday, September 24, and continues Monday, September 25.)

On Sunday, August 27, at 2 p.m., we are partnering with the Tampa JCCs and Federation to host a panel on being Jewish in school today. We'll also discuss the antisemitism our kids have faced in the schools, how they've been addressed, and what our families can do whenever there is a concern. We'll have representatives of our Jewish Community Relations Council and the Hillsborough School District there to share their experiences and suggestions.

Being Jewish anywhere other than Israel means being part of a minority, and we can't change that. Sometimes being part of a minority has its challenges, but it also has the potential to be extremely empowering and a tremendous source of pride. As we enjoy our summer and prepare for another New Year, I pray that our differences may be openings for understanding, lead us to a strengthened identity, and remind us to give others the same compassion we seek for ourselves in moments when that kindness and understanding are so deeply needed.

The Legend of Zelda: Tears of the Kingdom - A Triumph of Torah

othing has more staying power than a story. When the Jewish people were at their lowest, divided and conquered, it was the Torah, the narrative of our

people, which brought us all back together, and we read that story over and over, every single year, never experiencing it the same way twice. It is a story that, despite its historical context, speaks to us in our own day, encouraging us to take it to heart and sometimes even to struggle with it, to solve its puzzles and face its challenges. The Torah is a story that I have devoted

my life to reading and telling, and I know most of us feel some sense of commitment to carry on the story.

And most of the time, the works around which we structure our lives are old stories, left in antique books by wise people a long time ago, but we know that we can find meaning in anything that has something to say to us. This is why I'm going to try to share one of my own experiences. I will try to explain why *The Legend of Zelda: Tears of the Kingdom*, the 29th game in a venerable series from Nintendo, has become one of my most treasured Jewish texts.

The Legend of Zelda is a series of adventure games that started in 1986 on the Nintendo Entertainment System. The original game was based on Shigeru Miyamoto's experiences exploring the forest, delving into caves, and finding small treasures as a child. It gave the player a map to explore and very little guidance on how to do so. As the main character, Link, players would defeat evil creatures and find new

tools to traverse the world. Most *Zelda* games, as they're called, feature a similar setting and goals. Link has to defeat evil in order to rescue a princess, Zelda. But it is a classic story that manages to renew itself each time through the evolution of how the game works.

The newest installment of the series, *Tears of the Kingdom*, places the player in a very similar situation. A new evil has arisen, the princess is missing, and Link must answer the call to adventure. There is a massive world to explore, about 160 square miles, along with a massive underground cave system and islands floating in the sky. Every piece of the map has small puzzles to solve or new things to discover. I would set a goal for myself and then immediately be drawn off-track to something else and find myself on the other side of the map from where I had planned on being. The scale of the world in the game is Talmudic, a vast expanse of stories to be discovered, sights to be seen, and wisdom to learn. Sometimes we set





ourselves to a purpose in learning or in our community and find something we'd never expected, end up in conversations we'd never have anywhere else, or grow meaningfully close to people in ways that catch us off guard. The adventurous world of the game subtly moves the player towards discovery and growth.

The best part of this game, though, is an innovative game play system that lets the player combine multiple technological and mundane objects together in a huge variety of ways. Let's say that puzzle you're presented with is to cross a large gap. You can just lay out some wooden planks and make a bridge or you can launch a platform over with a catapult or you can build a working helicopter and fly over or an infinite number of other possibilities. Like in Judaism, we are given lots of tools to work with and we can use them to find straightforward solutions to a problem or we can dig a little deeper and find something a little more elegant or satisfying. Most of us are going to have a handful of

Jewish tools we turn to a lot of the time, some we'll use a little more rarely in special circumstances, and some of which we might not touch. I have texts I keep in my back pocket, just like I have a fan-based flying air bike ready to go whenever I'm exploring in the game.

Not to sound like a video game apologist, but I know video games aren't for everyone, but for me and a lot of other folks of all ages, games like Zelda: Tears of the Kingdom can be more than a kind of escapism into a "more interesting" world. They can become playgrounds for exploration into deep ideas and philosophy or a place to act out some of our creative impulses in ways impossible in physical reality. If I'm going to spend my time engaging in a world, taking in a story, I need to know that it's going to have some valuable Torah to teach. And the great news is that wherever we look, if we look hard enough, we can always find good Torah.

Upcoming Jewish Holidays

Tishah B'Av (July 26-27)

A day of mourning the destruction of both ancient Temples in Jerusalem. In modern times, many Jews understand Tishah B'Av as a day to remember many tragedies that have befallen the Jewish people throughout history, and to reflect on the suffering that still occurs in our world.

Tu B'Av (Aug. 1-2)

A Chag HaAhava (Festival of Love) commonly called "Jewish Valentine's Day," Tu B'Av is considered a particularly auspicious day for romance, expressions of love, and even weddings.

Selichot (Sept. 9)

Selichot, penitential prayers said before the High Holidays, offer us opportunities for personal reflection and to seek forgiveness from those we wronged during the year.

Rosh Hashanah (Sept. 15-16)

Rosh Hashanah (literally, "Head of the Year") is the Jewish New Year, a time of prayer, self-reflection, and t'shuvah.

Yom Kippur (Sept. 24-25)

Yom Kippur means "Day of Atonement" and refers to the annual Jewish observance of fasting, prayer, and repentance.

Sukkot (Sept. 29-Oct. 6)

"Sukkot," a Hebrew word meaning "booths" or "huts," refers to the Jewish festival of giving thanks for the fall harvest. The holiday has also come to commemorate the 40 years of Jewish wandering in the desert after the giving of the Torah atop Mt. Sinai.

Sh'mini Atzeret & Simchat Torah (Oct. 6-7)

Immediately following Sukkot, we observe Sh'mini Atzeret and Simchat Torah, a fun-filled day during which we celebrate the completion of the annual reading of the Torah and affirm Torah as one of the pillars on which we build our lives. As part of the celebration, the Torah scrolls are taken from the ark and carried or danced around the synagogue seven times.

For our active adults and active seniors,

we are excited to share that this fall will debut a menu of programs that includes group hikes, biking meetup opportunities, day trip adventures, museum tours, and perhaps even a few short overnight adventures. We will continue hosting our monthly Senior Luncheons and Game Afternoons while looking to build an even more robust adult community experience. We know that not all the events we will schedule will appeal to everyone. We hope that something we offer will speak to each of you and invite building connections and meeting new people. We know this will, in turn, strengthen our already strong larger congregational community.

Brotherhood will be a \$25,000 Torah Circle Challenge Giver this year!




