
her milestone anniversary.

My Heart is in the East

n November 27, 1095 the newly elected Pope Urban II called on his followers to put their differences aside and reclaim the Holy Land from the Seljuk Turks who had conquered the land twenty years prior, creating new barriers for Christians aiming to make pilgrimage. And so it was that somewhere between 60,000 and 100,000 followed the Pope's call, and the First Crusades began. While Jews were not the targets of the Pope's directive, the Crusaders and others took liberty, and throughout the Rhineland those who wouldn't convert were brutally killed. (This is the time of Amnon of Mainz about whom we read during our High Holy Days).

In July of 1099 the Crusaders captured Jerusalem, killing most of the city's non-Christian inhabitants, mostly Muslim, but including the Jews who had barricaded themselves in their synagogues, only to be burned or sold into slavery.

While the Ashkenazi world was shattered, the Sephardic Jews of Spain were watching painfully, but safely, and the great poet and philosopher Yehuda Halevi was one of them. He was grieving both the German Jewish community and the Golden City of Jerusalem when he wrote the words:

Libi b'mizrach va'anochi b'sof ma'arav My heart is in the east, and I in the uttermost west– How can I find savor in food? How shall it be sweet to me? How shall I render my vows and my bonds, while yet Zion lies beneath the fetter of Edom, and I in Arab chains?*

A light thing would it seem to me to leave all the good things of Spain– Seeing how precious in mine eyes to behold the dust of the desolate sanctuary.

*Edom was a common euphemism for Christendom, and while Spain was under Muslim control, Halevi lived near the end of what was known as the Golden Age of Jewish Culture in Spain, and relationships between the two had been relatively positive, with quite a bit of interaction.

Halevi had never been to Jerusalem, but he felt her pain, just as he felt the entire Jewish world's pain in that era. Halevi would ultimately travel toward Jerusalem in 1140, at the age of 65, and while he would never make it (there are different versions of his death, including Egypt or right at the gates of the Old City), letters show the joy he found in attempting the journey.

But what interests me most is Halevi's life from 1096 until he made his journey in 1140. While he wrote of his inability to find any joy in life or accomplish anything while he was yearning to be in a home he had never seen before, Jerusalem, in reality Halevi was a successful physician and philosopher. While among his poems were other elegies, poems of mourning and loss, the majority were poems about friendship and love, laudatory praise, and even a significant collection of Hebrew riddles. Halevi yearned to be with his brothers and sisters in Jerusalem, and he mourned the loss in the Ashkenazi world. and yet, he continued to live his life the best he could.

So many of us have been able to relate with Yehuda Halevi in the days following October 7. Our hearts have been in the East, watching the news, mourning the horrific losses, struggling to explain our pain to friends, colleagues, classmates, and neighbors. And while our hearts are surely in the East, like Halevi, we are in the West, and like Halevi, we too have found ways for our lives to continue, enjoying our celebrations and, in our own way, writing poems and stories of friendship and love, keeping so much of our hearts in Jerusalem as we do.

As I write this article in the week of Thanksgiving, an agreement has been reached to release a first significant group of hostages, and my hope and prayer is that by the time of publication all of the hostages have been freed and we are closer to an end of Hamas' rule in Gaza and moving on to a next chapter that will lead us toward peace, but regardless of where the situation finds itself, I know that our hearts continue to be in the East. My prayer is that we, too, will soon be able to have a conversation about visiting Israel as a congregation, knowing that many will visit as individuals in the meantime. And even as our hearts are in the East, I also pray that our lives in the West will continue to thrive. I pray that we will continue to find joy in our celebrations and success as we continue to study, learn, and grow. I pray that understanding of the situation will grow, and we will be able to find peace in our relationships that have been stressed and compromised. I pray that both East and West will find themselves that much closer to a time of peace.



The Stone the Builder Rejected

he currency of Judaism, as in most religious traditions, is metaphor. The world is so big and incomprehensible. All kinds of things happen to us every day, seemingly without reason. And all of it must come from somewhere. We respond to this confusion by offering ways to understand the world. One image that appears frequently is stone or rock. We live on ground mostly made of it. The first tools used by humankind were made from it. It makes sense that stone would make sense to us. God is Tzur Yisrael, the Rock of Israel, our sturdy and strong protector. We read in Psalm 118 that the people of Israel are like the stone that the builders rejected which then becomes the cornerstone of something much greater. And the Israelites erect standing stones at places of significance, the stone as a witness to a moment in history. A few months ago, the image of stone took on a new meaning for me.

One Friday night, I came home from services to a pain just worrying enough to send me to the hospital, where, after an ultrasound and a CT scan. I was told that I had a few small kidney stones. I got my prescription painkillers, asked for some Tylenol so I could still drive home, and went on my merry way. And then I experienced the worst pain I'd ever felt. A searing ache or something like being stabbed; a pain beyond words. I wept from the pain, hoping that I could make it until the pharmacy opened. But it was too much to bear. I made it back to the ER, pacing back and forth, until the nurses found a vein and dulled the pain. For three days, there was an occasional ache, a tightness or a pressure. I changed everything. I took a few days off from work. I set eight alarms a day on my phone for the eight pills I needed to take to stave off the horror. I drank more water than I had in the past month in those few days. And I kept a close eye on my body and its needs. But the rock of Israel, the stone I had built and which my body had

rejected, slowly made its way out. And when I set my eyes on the 1 millimeter lump of crystal that had made my life Hell. I couldn't be angry. I was proud of getting through this and I admire something that can punch above its weight that much. And it has dawned on me, that my experience with this kidney stone gave me so much more good than bad.

I went back to work after the experience with renewed energy and love of life. Every moment not in pain was a gift. I read the words of Asher Yatzar, one of our morning blessings which is also said after using the bathroom, with new eyes. In giving thanks to God for the wondrous workings of our bodies, it says, "You created us with wisdom with many openings...and if one should be closed when it needed to be opened or opened when it needed to be closed, then it would be impossible to live and stand before You." I wonder if the author of that prayer went through what I went through. It is truly a blessing when our



incredibly (maybe needlessly) complicated bodies do everything they're built to do without pain or difficulty. I feel so much more grateful to my body and I've been drinking a lot more water and working to make it a priority. If we are created in God's image, taking care of that image must be holy.

I also learned that I was not alone. As I began to talk about my experience, others in our community shared theirs with me. Knowing that others had been through that pain made me feel like part of something bigger, as I received diet tips and nephrologist recommendations. My suffering had given me the chance to be vulnerable with others and when we're vulnerable, we can connect more deeply. I received so many texts and calls from friends, colleagues, and congregants. I felt so loved. And I feel more urgently the need to reach out to others in pain. Suffering is awful but so much worse is to suffer alone.

My doctor told me there's a 50/50 chance that I'll have another kidney stone in the next seven years. I know that if that happens, I'll have the sturdy rock of my community supporting me and the Rock of Israel, our God and our tradition, at my back. Rock on.

here is a funny thing about time. As a parent, I look back on the earliest months and I think about wishing for time to speed up, for one milestone to lead to the next, for the advancement from rolling to crawling to toddling to walking. 
