Up All Night for Shavuot

Shavuot commemorates the spring harvest and the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai.

I was definitely a “crammer” growing up. For those who don’t know the term, or who are even further removed from high school than I am, “cramming,” or “pulling an

all-nighter,” is when a student stays up all night before an exam, studying all the things they should have been studying in the weeks leading up to their test.

In Judaism, we have an annual all-night cramming session connected to the holiday of Shavuot. Shavuot is the third of the pilgrimage festivals along with Sukkot and Passover, but unlike Sukkot, which gives us the building of huts in our backyards, and Passover, which lets us celebrate with our families as we eat matzah and remember the Exodus out of Egypt, the biblical Shavuot doesn’t give us much. As you can imagine, this was a problem for the Rabbis. Not only does a holiday need a reason for celebrating it, but we also need a special opportunity to eat. So, the Rabbis did some creative math, and they determined that the date



of Shavuot coincided with the date that Moses ascended Mount Sinai to receive the Ten Commandments.

A midrash tells the story that the Israelites went to bed early the evening before this big day, wanting to be well rested, but their sleep was so good they slept late, and Moses had to wake them up. And this is where the tradition of our Shavuot all-nighter comes from. The *Tikkun Leil Shavuot* originated with the kabbalist mystics of 16th century Tzfat to compensate for the sleepiness of our ancestors. (While the custom of eating dairy [blintzes, cheesecake, etc.] on Shavuot has many explanations, I’m convinced it’s to help a historically

lactose intolerant people stay awake.)

I first experienced this Erev Shavuot tradition while living in Israel, where there are literally hundreds of options for classes throughout the night, and many people will hop from synagogue to synagogue until it’s time for the morning service. And while we don’t have the same options in Tampa, I hope you’ll join us on Erev Shavuot on Thursday, May 25, at Congregation Beth Am, as we join with our neighboring synagogues with opportunities for any of you to teach something that you find interesting (Jewish or not) as we prepare for this year’s commemoration of the Revelation at Sinai.

It's Never Too Late

Her hand trembled as she approached the Torah and picked up the pointer, prepared to read aloud from the sacred scroll before her family and

congregation for the first time. She had practiced the Hebrew words for months and had waited to celebrate her bat mitzvah her entire life. Not just 13 years, like most Jewish children. Ninety-three years.

For Evelyn Straus, this religious milestone was the fulfillment of a life-long commitment to her Judaism. She had lived her life watching every other family member become *b'nei mitzvah*. She had been a Jewish wife, mother, volunteer, grandmother, great-grandmother ... but now it was time to celebrate her own service.

Evy, as she is known amongst her friends, turned 13 in 1943, a time when girls were not called to the Torah. She grew up in an orthodox family and was proud of her Jewish heritage. She was always a member of a congregation but felt as though she was missing out on something. Evy had thought about

having an adult *bat mitzvah* service, but she was apprehensive. She didn't want to do it as part of an adult class, and she wasn't sure she could learn the Hebrew. But when her granddaughter's husband told her a few years ago that his grandfather had just celebrated a *bar mitzvah* at 93, she knew she had to try. "Go for it," he said. "If you want to do it, do it!"

Evy chose her 93rd birthday, March 11, 2023, for her special day. Her biggest challenge was learning the Hebrew. Evy had taught herself how to read Hebrew when she was in her late 20s, but it was difficult to keep up with. Now, at 92, she was determined to do it. She met every week with me, learning her prayers and Torah portion and met with Rabbi Simon to write her *d'var Torah*.

"While I'm scared that I'm going to goof up," she told me the week before her service, "I'm most excited to have my family and friends with me. I want to

show them that you can accomplish anything at any age if you just put your mind to it." And as the oldest *b'nei mitzvah* at Schaarai Zedek, she has proven her point.

Evy loves life! She taught Kindergarten in Maryland for 20 years and loved every second of it. She only stopped teaching to move down to Florida to be closer to her daughter and grandchildren. She has watched her grandchildren grow up, get married and even welcomed a great grandchild into the world a few years ago. She keeps her teaching skills up by volunteering at the Tampa Bay History Center - 14 years and still going strong. Evy has never stopped living and enjoying life.

"What words of advice do you have for *b'nei mitzvah* students?" I asked her.

"Be proud of your Judaism, and don't let it drop after your service. Continue being a proud Jew. Work hard and remember to celebrate YOU on your day. You have earned it!"

Yes, Evy - you certainly have.

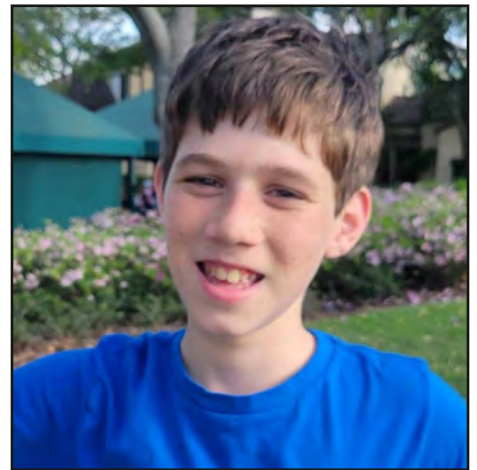

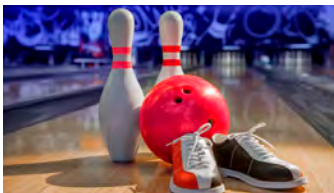

But the challenge with cramming and pulling all-nighters is retention. I would often do well on the tests I had stayed up all night studying for, but if I was asked later on to recount what I had learned, I'd be left looking like a deer in the headlights, hardly remembering the topic, let alone the details. And this is where we come to a second important observance connected to Shavuot.

The Book of Ruth tells the story of Naomi, a widow whose two sons married Moabite women. When her sons also died, she encouraged her daughters-in-law to return to their people, but Ruth, in the most recognized verse of the Book, says, "Do not urge me to leave you, to turn back and not follow you. For wherever you go, I will go; wherever you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God." Ruth represents a lifetime commitment to Jewish life and study, taking the moment of Revelation and continuing to learn and grow from that moment with genuine love.

This story is still connected to the path of Jews by Choice today, and we will honor the Jews by Choice in our community on Friday, May 26, at the Shabbat service concluding Shavuot, hearing the journey of those who most recently entered this first stage of their Jewish life and offering a blessing to all those who have repeated the words of Ruth, and according to the midrash, fulfilled their destiny, as it is taught that all Jewish souls were at Mt. Sinai that day, whether they were born Jewish or not.

As we celebrate this festival of Shavuot, we know that we cannot cram a lifetime of Jewish study into one evening, and rather than an all-nighter, we celebrate our ability to be all-lifers, committed to a lifetime of learning new ways in which our Judaism can enrich our lives, bringing value and meaning to every day. Just as Moses' face was glowing as he descended Mt. Sinai, may we all find that same light and inspiration from our Torah and its lessons every day of our lives. ●
