A View from the Mountaintop

After time away, the transition back to daily life mirrors the soul work of Elul and the Days of Awe.

f vacation is "time away from one's normal routine," I couldn't have asked for a better one. After being invited to visit good friends in Lake Tahoe as their son became bar mitzvah, Jacquelyn and I took advantage of the opportunity to show the kids a part of the country neither of us had explored. This led to a road trip that included both Death Valley and Yosemite National Parks. Watching the kids out of their normal element, hiking to the tops of mountains, seeing landscapes like they had never seen before, was truly magical.

But this vacation wasn't just an escape from the heat (even Death Valley felt comfortable compared to our humid 100 degrees). For the week we were on the West Coast, I mostly stayed away from the news, and to be honest, it was glorious. I didn't forget what was going on in the world or pretend there weren't problems, but I had the chance to focus on those problems a little less than usual, taking the concept of vacation to heart on multiple levels.

And then we came home.



In addition to catching up on a week and a half of emails, I found myself more troubled seeing all I had missed in the news at once than I would have been consuming it in real time. I realized that just as nice and necessary as a vacation from reality can be, reentry can be jarring, especially when everything hits you all at once.

Here we find both the opportunity and the risk of the High Holy Days. We are given the chance to step back and reflect on our world and our lives. If we haven't been checking in regularly, taking stock of our actions and choices, the ways we've grown and where we've fallen short, trying to do it all in one sitting can feel overwhelming.

Luckily, the Hebrew calendar gives us a transition period my red-eye flight never offered. The month of Elul, which just began on August 25, allows us to ease in. It gives us a month before Rosh HaShanah to begin listening more closely and to start the process of *cheshbon hanefesh*, the accounting of the soul with which we are tasked during the High Holy Days.

Some years, we come into this season ready to reflect. Other years, we arrive already feeling heavy. The world feels broken in so many ways, and it can be hard enough just to get through the day, let alone make time for spiritual inventory. And yet, that's exactly what makes this season so valuable. It creates space to pause, to catch our breath, to ask what kind of people we want to be—not in spite of what we see in the world, but because of it.

The work of the High Holy Days doesn't require us to fix the world, or even to fix ourselves. It just asks us to be willing to look, to notice, and to care. When we take even a few moments to "come back from vacation" and really look at our lives, beyond regret, guilt, or the pressure to do better, we can find perspective, beauty, and hope. This makes the High Holy Days that much more meaningful when they arrive.

In fact, it might not be so different from the reward of finishing a difficult hike and finding yourself standing at the edge of a canyon or looking out across a mountaintop and taking in the view. The view of your own life—the full, complicated, admittedly imperfect sweep of it—can be just as awe-inspiring. In a world that can feel overwhelming, that kind of "vacation" might be exactly what we need.

Cleansing Our Soles

or many Jews, the High Holy Days represent an opportunity for a new start, to make up for old mistakes, and to make resolutions for the year to come.

This year, I plan to keep a promise I've made to myself for the past few years, but haven't been able to keep. For Yom Kippur 5786, I plan to finally get myself a pair of white tennis shoes.

While it might seem silly, there's actually a Jewish ritual reason for it. Most know that we fast for the whole day on Yom Kippur, but the rabbis in the Mishnah have other "afflictions" for us, forbidding applying ointments or oils, washing in any way, fulfilling one's spousal duties, and, of course, not wearing shoes.

The Talmud then clarifies that the law is actually to avoid wearing leather shoes which would have been the most comfortable kind of shoe in antiquity. All of these prohibitions seek to deprive us of comfort and luxury. This provides an opportunity for empathy with those who don't have the

same comforts as us and humility as we learn to spend a day with just a little less.

Comfort can be hard to give up though and often we achieve it at the expense of others. Consider the farm laborers barely scraping by who harvest our food and help it find its way to convenient supermarkets. Remember the delivery drivers who bring food and groceries right to our door without job protections or benefits. And think of the underpaid workers, adults or even children, who make our shoes. Unless we're specifically sourcing our clothes from businesses we know are ethical, all of us have something in our wardrobe that has been marred by the curse of greed and inequality.

Jewish tradition understands that all of us are susceptible to our selfish instincts and that seeking comfort has a particularly powerful pull. Most of us know the story of Joseph, who was sold into slavery by his brothers, but a midrash creatively imagines how the brothers used the money. They sell him for the going rate for a working-age male, 20 shekels, which might be a lot if it wasn't being divided

among 10 brothers. According to Midrash Tanchuma, they each had enough to buy a pair of comfy shoes.

In the Haftarah for that very Torah portion, the prophet Amos accuses the Israelites of selling "for silver those whose cause was just and the needy for a pair of shoes." For comfy feet, it seems, people are willing to betray their loved ones and their values.

We cannot worship at the altar of comfort, even if it has a lot of religious adherents these days. Yom Kippur gives us a chance to leave some of our luxuries behind and focus on our spiritual needs. The practice may even inspire us to help others meet their basic needs as well as the creature comforts that we value so highly.

On this coming Day of Atonement, may each of us worry less about what we wear on our feet and more about the kindness and generosity in which we enrobe our hearts. And, if anyone knows the best place to get ethically made and sourced white tennis shoes, send me an email!

Creating HaMakom: More Than Just a Space

As we approach our High Holy days and the turning of our Torah from Deuteronomy back to Genesis, I often find myself recalling the narrative from Genesis, Chapter 28 as Jacob awoke from his sleep and said, "Surely the LORD is present in this place, and I did not know it!" Shaken, he said, "How awesome is this place! This is none other than the abode of God, and that is the gateway to heaven."

The word "makom" utilized in this context refers to a specifical physical place, yet I believe the intent far transcends a geographic parameter. HaMakom is more than just a place—it's a community that comes alive through two things: having a space where people can gather, and building real, meaningful connections between those people.

On one level, HaMakom is about the space. Our building, be it our sanctuary, our social hall or our classrooms, provides a tangible meeting point where we begin the work of deepening the meaning of Makom. What matters isn't so much what it looks like, but that it's set aside for people to come together. It's a space where people show up with intention—to connect, to reflect, to celebrate, to grieve, or just to be present with each other.

But just having a space isn't enough to make a community. What really brings HaMakom to life are the relationships that form within that space. When people show up not just to be in the same room, but to really see and listen to each other, something powerful starts to happen. That's where connection takes root—in the conversations, the shared meals, the



laughter, the tears, and the sense that you're not alone.

Recognizing this intersectionality between physical space and intentional relational connection is the foundation from which we attempt to build meaningful opportunities for you, regardless of your age or stage of life.

It takes commitment to building out both opportunities for gathering and fostering connections between those who gather before the benefits of the investment can be felt. This summer, I had an opportunity to visit with two former teens, from very different stages of my career, now working together in Philadelphia to expand Makom Community, a Jewish afterschool opportunity rooted in shared values and placemaking-both for the student in their program and the families connected to their students. It became apparent as I explored their space that the deep investment in ensuring the Jewish spaces being created reflect our history, our present AND our future is a vital necessity to remain relevant to even the most engaged members of any community.

And here's the thing: community like this doesn't just magically happen. It takes

intention. It takes people who are willing to create a welcoming space and hold it with care. It takes folks who are open to listening, sharing, being a little vulnerable, and making room for others to do the same. When that happens, something really special unfolds. People don't just attend—they feel like they belong. They're not just part of an event—they're part of something that's alive.

In a world where a lot of us are feeling disconnected or overwhelmed, I hope our makom, our special place, offers a different way of being together. It reminds us that community isn't something you find—it's something you build. When we gather with intention, and care about the people in the room, we're doing something sacred. While we know we will see many of you as we celebrate Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur followed by Sukkot and Simchat Torah, we hope to see you in many of our smaller settings as well—Game Afternoon, Mahj and More, Movie Matinee's and beyond to continue fortifying the human connections that make our spaces so holy. We're creating HaMakom—not just a place, but a people. A community that holds space for everyone to be seen, heard, and connected.




