# The Sacred Gift of Community

As the end of the calendar year draws near, while life can feel rather frenzied, our hearts naturally turn toward gratitude and celebration. As we recognize all we have and all we have built, may we celebrate not only the gifts we receive, but also the gift we create together: a community rooted in gratitude, alive with joy, and open to all who seek a place within it.

# Warmth, Not Positivity

This may be a strange concept for Florida natives, but in other parts of the country, folks experience something called "seasons" where the weather changes at different times of year. I jest, but what I've rarely heard talked about down here is Seasonal Affective Disorder, a kind of depression that can take hold of someone at a similar time of year every year. It can be serious, mild, or somewhere in between. It often happens when the days get shorter and there's less sunlight to warm our bodies and souls.

I know when I lived up north, I definitely got the winter blues and had to sit in front of a lamp in the morning that simulated sunlight. On paper, it feels like a weird thing to do, but it worked. A bit of light and warmth can do wonders.

We all have our low moments. Sometimes that's just how the chemicals in our brains work, and other times, our situation is really just that bad. Moses Maimonides, the great medieval Jewish thinker, who was also a medical doctor, was ahead of his time on the treatment of depression, seasonal or otherwise.

While in some places he prescribed alcohol (probably not the best choice when you're down), he also prescribed

music. And more importantly, he understood that treatment needed to be done in deep relationship with a medical professional who understood the nuances of their patient's life in every aspect.

Maimonides knew depression well for he experienced it himself after the tragic death of his brother, David. In a letter to a friend and fellow rabbi, he wrote: "For almost a year after receiving the sad news, I lay on my couch stricken with fever, despair, and on the brink of destruction. Close to eight years have now elapsed and I still mourn for him, for there can be no consolation."

He knew what it was like to be stuck in bed with no motivation, to dread the day's activities, and to see only darkness ahead. While Maimonides prescribed himself the study of Torah, he understood that everyone had their own path to emotional wellness.

And what he never said to his patient was something anyone who has been depressed has heard before, something along the lines of, "Look at how great your life is. Why be sad?" This is what we might call toxic positivity. Unable to understand why someone might be so "bummed out," we push to make them feel better. There is most certainly a better way and I found some inspiration in an unlikely place.

In a Tumblr post I found online, we read, "not sure if this will make sense to anyone besides me but: the antidote to negativity is not positivity, it's warmth. Positivity tells a sad person there's no reason to be sad. Warmth asks the sad person if they want to go get some ice cream."

When we see the people we love hurting, it hurts us as well, and we want to "fix" the problem. But that isn't how depression works! What actually helps, over time, is knowing that we have a support system, people who will reach out in kindness, who will sit with us in low places, and not pressure us to be inauthentic about how we feel.

In the Talmud, we read a story of Rabbi Elazar falling ill and lying in a dark room. His teacher, Rabbi Yochanan, visits Elazar, spends time with him, listens to his worries, and weeps alongside him. Only then was Elazar able to take his hand and head back out into the light.

Dictating how we think people should feel only widens the gulfs between us, but when we meet someone else's sadness with warmth, love, compassion, and thoughtful acts of kindness, that's when the real healing begins.

May we all find people in our lives to share that warmth and strive to be the people who share warmth in turn.



## **Reflections on Chanukah and Extremism**

ne light each night. That's it. That's all the Talmud describes as the mitzvah of Chanukah for each household. The zealous can light one candle for each member of the family. And the extremely zealous? Well, there's a disagreement there. Shammai said that they should go from eight lights the first night to one the first, and Hillel said they should go from one to eight.

To say that all of us are zealots as we will light our Chanukiyot this Chanukah would be a bit of a stretch, but it all depends on the way we think of the word zealous. In the context of lighting candles in our homes, Hillel and Shammai would have been thinking that the zealous are

those who want to go above and beyond, doing more than that which is required of them. But when it comes to Chanukah, the way we think about zealotry can make things a bit complicated. The Book of Maccabees (found in the Apocrypha and not included in the Hebrew canon) begins with Mattathias speaking against those Jews who have assimilated to Greek culture, and when one of them steps up to the altar, Mattathias kills him along with the Greek official who is with him, destroying the idolatrous altar. (I know, this isn't the Chanukah you learned in Sunday School). Mattathias declares, "Whosoever is zealous of the law, and maintains the covenant, let him follow me." The Maccabees, in the story, while going on to defeat the Syrian Greek army that had forbidden the practice of Judaism also take all those assimilated Jews who didn't join them as victims.

I'll be exploring this notion of zealotry and religious extremism, from the time of the Maccabees to today, at our lunch and learn on November 13, but I think without getting too deep into religious sociology, there is meaning that we can find in our lives today.

On the one hand, zeal can be hiddur mitzvah, adding beauty to a mitzvah. This can be a beautiful Chanukah menorah, but it can also be creating a gourmet meal for our family when the expectation is something simple, or cleaning out the garage when all we were asked to do was find the Chanukah decorations. Hillel and Shammai, even in their disagreement, take the notion of zealotry and water it down from that of



the Maccabees to something that can be truly beautiful.

But we can't ignore the zealotry of Mattathias and our own ability to fall into that trap in our own lives. If we become so convinced of our own righteousness that we view anyone who disagrees with us as wrong, we are guilty of that same destructive zealotry. We may not raise a sword, but words, attitudes, and actions can wound just the same.

Ultimately the Talmud accepts Hillel's practice, for we should only increase in matters of holiness rather than decrease. May our own desire to go above and beyond lead us to add holiness to the world, and may we keep things in perspective if our understanding of what's right is leading us to decrease the holiness around us. May our homes shine bright with the desire to bring love into the world, and may our Chanukah lights help us feel a sense of wholeness and peace.

#### **Chanukah Music**

For many families and communities, singing is a particularly joyous part of Chanukah celebrations. There are many traditional and contemporary songs for the holiday, and videos and recordings are widely available online.

"Maoz Tzur" ("Rock of Ages") is customarily sung after the lighting of the candles each night, and at other times throughout the holiday. It was composed in Europe in the 12th or 13th century.

"I Have a Little Dreidel" is a modern-day children's song frequently sung during the Festival of Lights. Other holiday favorites include "Chanukah, Oh Chanukah;" "Sivivon, sov, sov," a Hebrew folksong; "Light One Candle," written by Peter Yarrow; and "The Latke Song," by Debbie Friedman, z'l, the renowned Jewish singer and songwriter.

#### **How to Play Dreidel**

Dreidel is the traditional game played to celebrate Chanukah. The letters on the dreidel-nun, gimel, hei, and shin-are interpreted to stand for the first letter of each word in the Hebrew statement Neis gadol hayah sham, which means, "A great miracle happened there" and refers to the defeat of the Syrian army and the re-dedication of the Temple in the story of Chanukah. In Israel, one letter on the dreidel differs from those used in the

rest of the world. Instead of a shin, you will find the letter pei, transforming the Hebrew statement into Neis

gadol hayah po, which means, "A great miracle happened here."

Distribute an equal number of playing pieces to each person. Begin by having each of the players put one or two pieces into a common pot. Take turns spinning the dreidel and taking the actions determined by the letter you spin:

Nun: The player takes nothing. Gimel: The player takes all. Hei: The player takes half. Shin: The player puts in.

The winner is the person who collects all the playing pieces.



# **Chanukah Festival of Lights Home Guide**

First Chanukah Candle: Sunday, December 14, 2025 Eighth Chanukah Candle: Sunday, December 21, 2025

hanukah, the Festival of Lights, begins on the 25th of Kislev and lasts for eight nights. This year, we light the first candle on the evening of December 14.

The holiday commemorates the re-dedication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem in 165 BCE, after a small group of Jewish fighters, known as the Maccabees, rose up against the oppressive rule of King Antiochus IV of Syria. Antiochus had outlawed Jewish practice and attempted to force Greek worship and culture onto the Jewish people as part of a larger political campaign.

While many in the community gave in to pressure, the Maccabees refused to abandon their faith. Against overwhelming odds, they reclaimed the Temple and reignited Jewish life. That victory was both military and spiritual - a story of survival, resilience, and identity.

Although the events of Chanukah aren't found in the Hebrew Bible, they're recorded in the Books of Maccabees, part of ancient Jewish literature. We don't just celebrate the miracle of oil that lasted eight days, we celebrate the enduring strength of a people who held onto their beliefs in the face of adversity.

As we light the menorah each night, we honor the courage of our ancestors and rededicate ourselves to Jewish life, tradition, and community in our own time.

#### Chanukah Blessings (to be recited and/or sung each night)

Light the shamash (helper candle) first, using it to kindle the rest of the Chanukah lights. As you do, say or sing:

### בָּרוּדְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשְׁנוּ בָּמִצְוֹתָיו, וְצְנֵנוּ לְהַדְלִיק גֵר שֵׁל חַנֻכָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Chanukah.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

### בַּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֱלֶךְ הָעוֹלֶם, שֵׁעָשָׂה נִסִּים לַאֲבוֹתֵינוּ וָאָמוֹתֵינוּ בַּיָּמִים הַהֶם בַּוּמַן הַזֶּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim baz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wondrous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

Shehecheyanu prayer, for the first night only:

### בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, שֶׁהֶחֵיָנוּ וְקִיּמָנוּ וָהְגִּיעָנוּ לַזּמֵן הַזָּה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higiyanu laz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who has kept us alive, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

The *shamash* candle (servant candle) is used only to light the other candles. The individual candles are put in place starting with the right-hand side of the Menorah. The shamash is lit first. Then the candles are lighted from left to right, i.e., the last one placed in the Menorah is the first to be lit. One on the first evening; two on the second, until the eighth night of Chanukah eight candles are lit.

The Chanukah candles must bum for at least half an hour each night. On Friday eve, the Chanukah lights are kindled before the Sabbath lights. As the lights are lit, the blessings are sung or recited.

#### **Chanukah Values Calendar**

#### Celebrate each night of Chanukah with intention.

#### First Night - Kindness (chesed)

We light this candle to remind ourselves that kindness can be powerful. Every act of compassion, no matter how small, helps bring light to someone's day.

♥ Tonight's spark: Do one unexpected act of kindness: a compliment, a helping hand, or a note of gratitude.

#### Second Night – Justice (tzedek)

Tonight, we light for justice - standing up for what is right, even when it's hard. Our tradition teaches: *Tzedek*, *tzedek tirdof* - "Justice, justice you shall pursue." Justice means fairness, inclusion, and lifting others up.

*♣* Tonight's spark: Share or support a cause that reflects your values.

#### Third Night - Love (ahavah)

Love strengthens families, friendships, and communities. When we nurture our relationships, we bring lasting light into our lives.

♥ Tonight's spark: Call or message someone just to say, "I love you."

#### <u>Fourth Night - Responsibility (achrayut)</u>

We are responsible for one another - in our homes, schools, and the wider world. Our actions matter, even the small ones. Jewish tradition calls us to take part in creating a just and caring society.

♥ Tonight's spark: Pick one small thing you can do to improve your neighborhood or community.

#### <u>Fifth Night – Freedom (cherut)</u>

We honor the freedom our ancestors fought for - and reflect on those still yearning for it today. Freedom means the ability to live with dignity, to speak your truth, and to practice your faith. It also means protecting these rights for others.

**☼** Tonight's spark: Light a candle or say a prayer for people across the world who are not free.

#### Sixth Night - Peace (shalom)

Peace is more than the absence of war - it's justice, safety, and wholeness. Our ancestors dreamed of a world where swords would become plowshares. Let us do our part to build that world, starting with how we speak and act.

➡ Tonight's spark: Practice active listening — hear someone out without interrupting.

#### Seventh Night - Life (chayim)

We celebrate the gift of life - in all its joy, sorrow, and complexity. Every moment we are alive is a chance to bring goodness into the world. To live fully is to live mindfully, with awareness and appreciation.

*➡* Tonight's spark: Take a moment to breathe deeply, be present, and give thanks for being alive.

#### <u>Eighth Night – Repairing the World (tikkun olam)</u>

As our menorahs shine at full brightness, we renew our commitment to help heal a broken world. May the light we've kindled this week guide us all year long.
